Course description:

The lecture series aims to introduce students to the history and basic theories of modern sociocultural anthropology. The course emphasizes primarily the pillars of the discipline that reflect the research and methodological foundations of the doctoral program at Debrecen. The teaching of an emic, interpretive and critical perspective provides the basis for a qualitative ethnographic-anthropological vision that creates a semantic and theoretical bridge between the different doctoral topics, ensuring that students work within a genuine "school" framework in the doctoral programme. The course plays an important role in integrating students from different educational backgrounds into the doctoral school as an academic community.
